

Quality Childcare = Economic Returns

New data assessing the long-run consequences of economic adversity in childhood show the age at which children experience poverty matters for later-life outcomes. Duncan et al.(2010) show that children's future earnings and value to our society is affected more negatively by poverty experienced early in life, rather than later. Reducing the impacts of poverty early in life can therefore have long-term effects on our national economy.

Over the past four decades, a compelling body of data from a relatively small number of successful programs has begun to answer the question of how we help young children who are at risk for poor life outcomes due to poverty. The analysis of this data by child development researchers, education specialists, and economists has shown that it is possible to improve a wide range of outcomes for vulnerable children well into the adult years, as well as generate benefits to society far in excess of program costs. However, evaluations also have shown that many interventions, particularly those that are planned or implemented poorly, have generated few to no beneficial effects. Together, these positive and negative findings have contributed to a growing body of knowledge about both successful and ineffective programs and/or practices.

Quality childcare must have five items:

- Well educated and trained staff who understand and are responsive to young children
- Low ratios and group size where children get lots of attention
- Clean, safe, organized environment with lots of equipment and many play opportunities
- Comprehensive curriculum that uses ongoing monitoring to set specific goals that are individually and age appropriate
- Family members are included as partners in all aspects of the program

Quality is important and costly but lack of quality for our at-risk young children will cost our community much more.

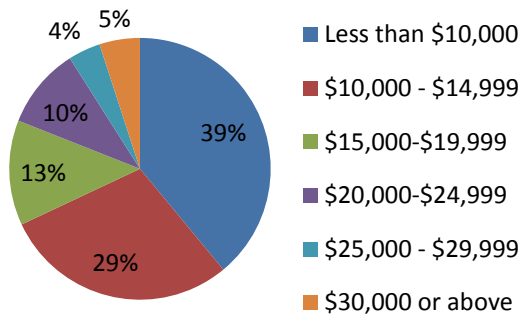
